The 58th Biennial NY State Convention promises to be an informative and productive time of faith, fun, and fellowship. It is supremely important that every court in our state be in attendance for this convention.

Through business meetings and daily Mass there is time to learn, time to share, time to pray, time to revel and time to relax. The days are filled with education and inspiration, the chance to offer advice and opinions, the opportunity to be involved in decisions about the future of CDA in NYS. The evenings are usually spent gathering with friends (old and new) to share experiences and perspectives on how to sustain and improve your court or just to relax and catch up.

A detailed convention packet will be mailed out in early January. The packet will contain registration and meal forms, hotel information, and specifics about convention activities.

All CDA members are invited and encouraged to attend the state convention. In addition to delegate seating, there will be areas for non-delegates to observe convention proceedings and workshops that are open to all registered members. Spouses and guests are invited to attend all liturgies and convention activities except the business meetings and workshops.

Each court Regent should have received from the National Office a delegate sheet along with instructions for electing the number of delegates and alternates to which the court is entitled. If your Regent did not receive this packet, she should contact the National Office immediately.

Courts must elect delegates to the convention in time to send the delegate list to the State Regent by March 31st. Please read the National Convention Mailing carefully to ensure that your court has the proper representation at the state convention.

Courts are allowed 2 delegates, one being the Regent if she attends, and an additional delegate for every 25 members or major fraction thereof.

Expenses to the state convention *may* be paid by the court. We encourage all courts to have a Convention Fund for this purpose.

Delegates and alternates are elected, not appointed. It is wise to elect all the delegates and alternates to which your court is entitled, even if it appears that they cannot attend the convention. Sometimes delegates are able to attend after all. No delegate sheets will be accepted after March 31st. (See "Delegates" in the Bylaws page 29)

This is an overview of the convention cost to aid in your planning. Daily registration and Commuter Meal prices will also be available and will be detailed in the Convention Mailing.

Seeds

The Holy Spirit spread his Many Gifts like a wildfire through works of the State Board this summer as we tilled the soil so that seeds could be planted into the hearts of our Sisters. Did your seeds get planted? Will these seeds go dormant or germinate?

According to **Merriam-Webster**, *dormancy* is: the state in which a seed is unable to germinate, even under ideal growing conditions; *germination* is: beginning to grow.

Following the theme of our Training, I decided to write about planting seeds. To do this with a little bit of color, I found an article by **Robert Pavlis** about what happens when seeds germinate or go dormant. This gave me a wealth of information and a whole new understanding as to what Jesus meant in his parable about the sower.

Since dormancy can be broken only by ideal growing conditions, seeds tend to germinate when they are the most likely to flourish. For a seed to germinate, survive and grow, it has to adapt to it's environment. All seeds have to land on the ground, be watered and get the light. Every seed has it's own reason for dormancy and the trick is to figure out what causes it. Understanding the reasons for dormancy will help you understand the methods to overcome it. (Think seeds=members.)

Once you start watering, never let the seed dry out or it will die. There may not be immediate external evidence of germination, many times the internal process has begun but may be hidden for a time, even years.

Immature Seeds. In many cases a seed may look ripe on the outside, but not be fully developed on the inside. Be patient with this type of seed as it needs more time to complete it's maturity.

Chemicals. Fruit seeds are covered with a chemical inhibitor that prevents germination, the seed needs to be soaked or washed in order to grow and spread fruit.

Hard Seed Coat. Walnuts have a hard outer shell that prevents water from being absorbed. The abrasion of soil and rocks need to wear a hole in the shell so that water can reach the seed. (Like a facial scrub to rid the dead skin and rejuvenate the good skin). Other seeds require a very hot water bath for 24 hours. (Like going into a sauna or hot tub to relax your hard-worked muscles.)

Internal Chemical Inhibitors. Some mother plants add a chemical inhibitor to the seed. Over time this decreases so that germination can take place. (Truly an example of what our mothers do to preserve innocence. We hated it as a child, but thank her many times later.)

Temperature. Some seeds germinate in the fall, stay under ground to be protected and then start to grow in the spring, other seeds require an extended period of warm weather, then a cold weather, then another warm period to finally trigger germination. (Maybe those hot-flashes have a purpose after all.)

Light. Seeds require light to grow, each one requires a different amount. Some seeds get planted so deep into the ground, that it prevents them from germinating — there is not enough light. They stay dormant, until their soil is disturbed to bring them to the surface where there is enough light. There are also seeds that need to remain in the dark in order to germinate because if they receive too much light they will stay dormant.

Fire. Some seeds are so tightly enclosed in a cone that they can't germinate or receive any water until the cone opens when exposed to fire, extreme heat, or smoke, releasing their seeds to germinate. (God inspired Moses to by planting His Seed through the Burning Bush.)

I leave you with the message that Jesus said to his apostles when they asked him why he told this parable of the sower. Listen then to what the parable of the sower means: When anyone hears the message about the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what was sown in their heart. This is the seed sown along the path. The seed falling on rocky ground refers to someone who hears the word and at once receives it with joy. But since they have no root, they last only a short time. When trouble or persecution comes because of the word, they quickly fall away. The seed falling among the thorns refers to someone who hears the word, but the worries of this life and the deceitfulness of wealth choke the word, making it unfruitful. But the seed falling on good soil refers to someone who hears the word and understands it. This is the one who produces a crop, yielding a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown. (Matt. 13: 18-21)

Enjoy the winter and the holiday celebrations, but keep your seeds watered so that when it is your time to germinate, they will grow a field of beautiful flowers.



It's Not Always What We Say, It's How We Say It

It's Beginning to Look a lot Like Christmas (& the 2023 Education Contest) MARY WESTERMANN, OSF, STATE EDUCATION

As the leaves are falling from the trees and the weather is getting colder (it was 31 degrees at my house this morning), our thoughts turn to Thanksgiving and Christmas and all the traditions we enjoy with our family and friends. Whether we enjoy the Macy's Thanksqiving Parade; binge watching Christmas movies on the Hallmark Channel (and several other channels now); traveling to New York City to see the Rockettes' Christmas show, St. Patrick's Cathedral, the Rockefeller Christmas tree and all the decorated store windows; attending our (grand)children's Christmas concerts; sending out Christmas cards; baking cookies and other treats or going to Midnight Mass at our parish Church, we all have traditions we love from year to year. I spent some time researching traditions that are loved by people in other countries and thought I would share a few of the more unusual ones in this article. I doubt I will be adding any to my family's traditions, but I did find these five to be the most fascinating:

- 1) In Japan where only 1% of the population is Christian, families celebrate Christmas by heading out to Kentucky Fried Chicken. The tradition began in 1974 when KFC held a wildly successful marketing campaign (translated as "KENTUCKY FOR CHRISTMAS"). People place their orders months in advance to avoid standing in line for two hours or more.
- 2) According to Norwegian folklore, witches and evil spirits come out on Christmas Eve for mischief. Families hide their brooms to stop them from being stolen for a midnight ride. Sometimes they even burn spruce logs in their fireplace to stop the witches and evil spirits from coming down the chimney.
- 3) On Christmas Day in the Czech Republic, unmarried women throw a shoe over their shoulders towards the front door of their home. If the shoe lands with its toe toward the door, the woman will get married the following year. However, if the heel points toward the door, she will remain single.
- 4) In Caracas, Venezuela, the residents head to Mass on Christmas morning on roller skates. The tradition is so popular the city's streets are closed to traffic so people can skate to Church safely.

5) Swedish Christmases are planned around an unusual television special. In the afternoon, people gather around to watch Donald Duck cartoons. This dates back to the 1960s when televisions were new in Sweden and played only two channels (one of which played Disney cartoons). One of the most popular cartoons is a 1958 one translated as "Donald Duck and his friends wish you a Merry Christmas".

What's In A Name?

Johanine, Nilan, Margaret Mary, Genevieve Walsh...where do some of our NY State Court names come from? A member brought this question, so I decided to find out! I asked a few members to tell us a bit about their court's name and history. I hope you find this as interesting as I do.

Court Peré Le Moyne #833

Court Peré Le Moyne #833 in Fulton, originally named Court Fulton, was organized in November 1923. In the mid 1950's our Court Chaplin, Rev. Msgr. Eugene M. Yennock replied to National Office's request that our court name be changed to that of a saint. Msgr. Yennock and the ladies of the court settled on Peré Le Moyne in honor of the French Jesuit missionary from Canada.

Father Simon Le Moyne, S.J., traveled with explorer Samuel De Champlain; Peré is the French address for a priest. In 1653, LeMoyne led a party down from Canada to explore the area and waterways to the south. In 1654, he was first white man to see the fishing village of Oswego Falls (now named Fulton). Legend has it that he was carried, canoe and all, around the portage (about a mile and a half by his Indian followers. His mission was to carry Christianity to the Indians. Buildings around the county have murals of Peré Le Moyne holding a cross on the river bank with his followers. Our Court's mission to this day is still to carry on charity to all.

Court #2438, St. Frances Cabrini, Coram SYLVIA MURDOLO, REGENT

Court St. Frances Cabrini #2438, Coram, located on Long Island was named for the Patroness of our Parish. St. Frances Cabrini is the patroness of immigrants and was a devotee to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. She was born in 1850 and died December 22, 1917 at 67 years old. Her full religious name is **Frances Xavier Cabrini** because she wanted to be a great missionary like **St. Francis Xavier.** To support that, Frances founded the **Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus** in November 1880. Her aim was missionary work in the Far East; however in 1887, when she asked **Pope Leo XIII** to travel there, his response was "Not to the East, but to the West."

When she arrived in NYC, **Archbishop Corrigan** was not supportive and advised Cabrini to take her sisters and go back to Italy. But Frances was persistent – she was on a

mission to catechize the Italian immigrants and care for orphans. Soon many schools and orphanages were founded by this determined little Italian lady.

Her greatest fear was traveling by ship, but she overcame that by taking 67 voyages, founding hospitals, schools, and orphanages – from New York to Chicago, Seattle, New Orleans, Denver, Los Angeles, Philadelphia – she even made international trips. She was naturalized as a US citizen in 1909. She was canonized in 1946 and our parish took her name when it was founded in 1953.

On her feast day (November 13th) our court honors our Patroness with flowers at her statue and offering her first class relic for the parishioners to venerate. Mother Cabrini inspires me not to give up in light of opposition. As a Court we follow the Lord's lead in all things and pray to Mother Cabrini to have the courage to go forward.

Court Dr. Tom Dooley #2183, Lake Placid EMMA LOU SMITH, PAST STATE OFFICER

Tom Dooley was born on January 17, 1927 in St. Louis, MO, to an Irish-American family. He received a Catholic education in elementary and high school and five semesters at the University of Notre Dame. After a brief stint in the Navy, he entered St. Louis University School of Medicine. Upon graduation he returned to the Navy as a hospital corpsman. In 1954 Dr. Tom was assigned to the USS Montaque and ended up in Vietnam.

Most of his remaining years were spent in Southeast Asia during the Vietnam War. During this controversial time in our nation, Dr. Tom Dooley became widely known for his humanitarian efforts and anti-communist political activities. The American people learned about these years through his letters to his mother as she shared them with the American press. In addition, his first book, **Deliver Us From Evil**, elaborated on his anti-communist activities and humanitarianism which resulted in an increase in his popularity. His account, although elaborated on and exaggerated, incited the anti-Vietnam sentiments in our nation.

Illness and a bout with cancer shortened his life at 34 years of age on January 18. 1961.

When our court was instituted, a member and the Pastor at the time researched several saints for a court name. The names were submitted to the Court for consideration. The Court voted to propose Dr. Tom Dooley as the court name and National agreed.

NATIONAL NEWS MARCH FOR LIFE 2023


